## PITCH FOR PETS

The shouts of “play ball” will echo again this summer when the Finney County Humane Society hosts its second annual “Pitch for Pets” softball tournament, June 26 and 27, at Wiley baseball complex.

The weekend fund-raising event is hosted by KUPK-TV and the FCHS to gain awareness of the need for pet adoptions and the importance of spaying and neutering pets. Glenda Hopkins, the society’s President, said funds generated through corporate sponsors, team registrations and a drawing for donated prizes will help ensure the adoption of hundreds of pets every year. Donations, she said, will help sponsor a spay/neuter program, help board pets, buy pet food, provide veterinary care and purchase advertisements.

Up to 13 adult men’s teams will vie for tournament honors during the community event. The action starts each day at 9 a.m.

Even though there will be no admission charge to the tournament, baseball fans will have an opportunity to enter a drawing for a wide array of prizes donated by local businesses. Items include, but are not limited to, dinners at local eateries, a professional eye exam, a produce basket, a silver coin, animal spaying or neutering, and a gift certificate from a local butcher and grocer. At press time the list was still growing.

Retailers who contribute certificates or coupons for prizes or services will garner listing in the baseball tournament’s program.

Hopkins said organizations that donate \$100 in cash or merchandise will also be listed on a commemorative t-shirt and get mentioned on a promotional TV commercial that will be airing two weeks prior to the tournament.

Additionally, FCHS volunteers will have adoptable pets on hand both days of the tournament.

Hopkins added that the Humane Society is a non-profit organization and that all donations are tax deductible. The society is staffed by volunteers, so all the money raised will go directly to support animal care programs. For example, pet owners who spay or neuter animals they adopt from the Garden City animal shelter receive a reimbursement from the FCHS. The society also pays the Kansas application fee for residents who wish to foster animals awaiting adoption. Many times homeless animals come into the shelter needing medical attention. The Humane Society often pays for these veterinary services.

Last year’s tournament was successful, she said, but much was learned and is being applied to stage an even better event this year.

THE FCHS and Animal Shelter would like to thank WalMart once again for the donation of hundreds of pounds of dog and cat food each month.

Late last year, a horse owner allowed her mare to starve to death. The Sheriff Deputies involved, the vet called in to help, and myself, as the representative for the FCHS, all knew that was a terrible and very wrong thing to have happen. Now, the justice system has also said that it was wrong. Adelbertha Martinez-Figueroa pled guilty to a charge of animal cruelty and was sentenced to 90 days in jail. She served three days in jail and the rest of the jail time was suspended. There are some of us that speculate that three days in jail were not enough. But, it is a start.

This is a time of learning for all involved. The Sheriff Deputies are now becoming more familiar with cruelty cases. I'm learning more about what takes place in the court system. And, hopefully the judicial system will come to realize what a rising problem this has become. At the first hearing on this case, the judge remarked that he so rarely sees any cruelty to animal cases. Well, I'm hoping that he sees a lot more in the future. We all know that the cruelty is taking place, now we just have to get it into the courtroom. At this time we have one cruelty charge that is pending against a horse owner and one case where horses are being watched for improvement.

We can't change a situation if we don't know about it. If you know of a situation where any kind of animal is being abused or not properly cared for, please tell someone. You can call and leave a message for the FCHS at 272-5651. You can call the Animal Shelter at 276-1152. You can call the Sheriffs office at 272-3700 or the Police Department at 276-1300. Animal's lives are depending on **YOU!** One person **can** make a difference.

August brings the Finney County Fair and we will be there. Stop by our booth for information and freebies.

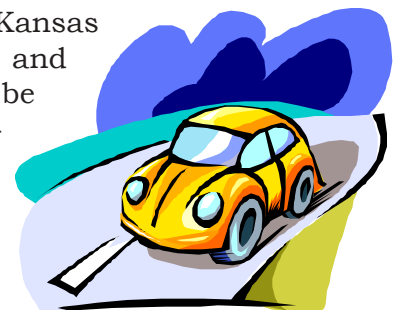

# V E T ' S V I E W

Kennel cough does not sound all that bad when you hear the name but if your dog has been a victim you understand it is a very annoying disease. Dogs with kennel cough have a deep dry cough that sounds like they are going to cough up a lung. At the end of a coughing spell they often gag up a small amount of white foamy material. Just what you want to hear and see in the middle of the night. Kennel cough is the result of a dog being exposed to the bacteria named bordetella bronchidaseptica. This bacteria hangs out in the lining of the dog's respiratory tract. The bordatella causes enough irritation that it starts coughing spells. The bacteria are readily transferred through the air and by nasal contact. Bordetella infections can sweep through a kennel or boarding facility very quickly. They often show signs of the infection about five days after being exposed. Sometimes the carrier animal may show very few signs making it difficult to isolate the source of the infection. It may also be transferred by dogs sniffing through a fence in the back yard or two dogs greeting each other during a walk. The good news is that for the most part it is not a life threatening disease; life annoying but not life threatening. The dog may be tired from coughing all night long and the owner from having to listen to them. Untreated kennel cough would clear up on it's own over the course of a month. But that can seem like a very long time so we often help by prescribing a couple medications. Prescribing an antibiotic will help shorten the duration of the disease and a cough suppressant makes the dog feel more comfortable. There are vaccines that can help prevent and/or reduce the severity of an infection. Some veterinarians have been frustrated by an incomplete protection after vaccination. Dogs that are going to be at a boarding facility or animals that are groomed on a regular basis may be required to have this vaccine. There are two forms of this vaccine. There is an injectable form that is given just like the distemper, parvo and rabies vaccine. There is also an intranasal vaccination that involves spraying the vaccine in the nose. This form of vacci-

nation stimulates a localized immunity where exposure first occurs. This past year there has been a running outbreak at the pound which is common when a large number of dogs that have limited vaccination histories are boarded together. The good news is that it has not cost any dogs more than a few sleepless nights. There have also been increases in the number of cases brought in to me at the clinic. I tell them kennel cough is not life threatening just life annoying. But I'll bet that's not much comfort when Fifi sounds like she is about to fall over from another coughing spell.

car with the windows mostly closed, they should call the police department at 620-276-1300. They should then write down the license plate number of the car. If possible, they should then stay in the area to direct the responding police officer to the car. If you see a dog, or other animal, which is kept outside with no shelter from the elements or no water, call the Garden City/Finney County Animal Shelter at 620-276-1152. Or, you can call the Garden City Police Department at 620-276-1300. If you don't see results in a timely manner, please call back.

Please make sure that your dog wears an identification tag and be sure that the tag has current information, including day and evening phone numbers.



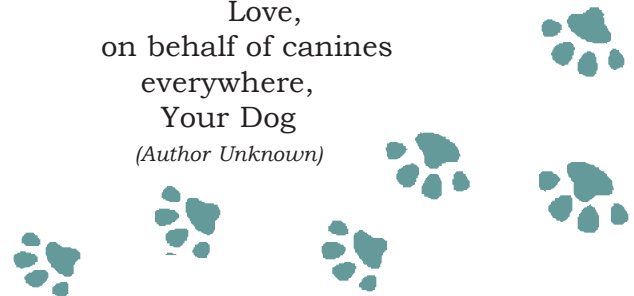
